the legendary austro hungarian novelist and essayist joseph roth was born in ukraine in 1894 and died tragically in paris in 1939 these letters span the breadth of roth s life from the schoolboy to the veteran of 44 marked by war poverty alcoholism the loss of his wife through madness and two decades of prolific work it is a deeply moving portrait of the life of the writer as an outsider in exile from a world he no longer recognized as his own

this newly revised all encompassing textbook is a guide to the history beliefs and practice of judaism beginning with the ancient near eastern background it covers early israelite history the emergence of classical rabbinic literature and the rise of medieval judaism in islamic and christian lands it also includes the early modern period and the development of jewry in the nineteenth and twentieth centuries extracts from primary sources are used throughout to enliven the narrative and provide concrete examples of the rich variety of jewish civilization specially designed to assist learning judaism introduces texts and commentaries including the hebrew bible rabbinic texts mystical literature jewish philosophy and jewish theology provides the skills necessary to understand these step by step with the help of a companion website explains how to interpret the major events in nearly four thousand years of jewish history supports study with discussion questions on the central historical and religious issues and includes key reading for each chapter an extensive glossary and index illustrates the development of judaism its concepts observances and culture with maps photos paintings and engravings links each chapter to a free companion website at routledge com cw cohnsherbok which provides things to think about things to do and tips for teachers as well as other online resources

unsettling difference challenges the major minor pattern that has framed discussions of german jewish difference focusing on instances that fall outside traditional understandings of minority culture exploring expressions of jewish identity and difference in biblical themed musical dramas and their literary sources adi nester argues that the issue of jewish difference should be treated as an aesthetic question in the first half of the twentieth century even amid the rise of pseudoscientific theories about race and blood drawing on the fraught parallel histories of opera and the modern reception of the hebrew bible in germany both significant in debates at the time about the nature of jewish separateness unsettling difference shows how this discourse troubles concepts of jewish marginality and non jewish german dominance through innovative readings of key works in this tradition rudolf borchardt s poem das buch joram paul ben haim s oratorio joram arnold schoenberg s opera moses und aron joseph roth s novel hiob and eric zeisl s opera hiob nester shows how these biblical adaptations foreground alternative notions of difference that rely on confusion ambiguity radical heterogeneity excess and repetition

whereas the cultural and political influence of the u s on europe and germany has been researched extensively the impact of more than 6 million german immigrants on u s american history and culture has received far less scholarly attention therefore this volume addresses a wide range of areas in which a german presence has been manifesting itself in the u s for more than three centuries among the disciplines involved in this broad analysis are linguistics literary studies history economics musicology as well as media studies and cultural studies

among the brilliant writers and thinkers who emerged from the multicultural and multilingual world of the austro hungarian empire were joseph roth robert musil and ludwig wittgenstein for them the trauma of world war i included the sudden loss of the geographical entity into which they had been born in 1918 the empire was dissolved overnight leaving austria a small fragile republic that would last only twenty years before being annexed by hitler's third reich in this major reconsideration of european modernism marjorie perloff identifies and explores the aesthetic world that emerged from the rubble of vienna and other former habsburg territories an austro modernism that produced a major body of drama fiction poetry and autobiography perloff explores works ranging from karl kraus s drama the last days of mankind and elias canetti s memoir the tongue set free to ludwig wittgenstein s notebooks and paul celan s lyric poetry throughout she shows that austro modernist literature is characterized less by the formal and technical inventions of a modernism familiar to us in the work of joyce and pound dada and futurism than by a radical irony beneath a seemingly conventional surface an acute sense of exile and a sensibility more erotic and quixotic than that of its german contemporaries skeptical and disillusioned austro modernism prefers to ask questions rather than formulate answers

siegfried kracauer was one of the most important german thinkers of the twentieth century his writings on weimar culture mass society photography and film were groundbreaking and they anticipated many of the themes later developed members of the frankfurt school and other cultural theorists no less remarkable were the circumstances under which he made these contributions after his early years as a journalist in germany the rise of the nazis forced kracauer into exile first in paris and then after a protracted flight via marseilles and lisbon to the united states the existential challenges personal losses and unrelenting hardship kracauer faced during these years of exile formed the backdrop against which he offered his acute observations of modern life jörg später provides the first comprehensive biography of this extraordinary man based on extensive archival research später s biography expertly traces the key influences on kracauer s intellectual development and presents his most

important works and ideas with great clarity at the same time später ably documents the intensity of kracauer s personal relationships the trauma of his flight and exile and his embrace of his new homeland where finally the groundlessness of refugee existence gave way to a more stable life and with it some of the intellectually most fruitful years of kracauer s career the result is a vivid portrait of a man driven both by an urge to capture reality to attend to the things that are overlooked or misjudged that still lack a name as he put it and by a need to find his place in a hostile threatening world

the fragility of the liberal democratic state after 1789 is illustrated in the history of the european jews from the french revolution to the holocaust emancipation and hope of emancipation amongst the european jewish population created a plethora of jewish identities and forms of patriotism this book takes the original approach of studying european jewish patriotism as a whole with particular attention given to creative literature despite their growing awareness of racial genocidal hatred most european jews between 1789 and 1939 tended to be patriotic toward the countries of their citizenship an attitude reflected in the literature of the time yet the common assumption among emancipated jews that anti semitism would fade in a world governed by reason proved false for millions of european jews the infinite possibilities they associated with emancipation came to nothing the jewish experience exposed many of the weaknesses and failings of the liberal multicultural state and demonstrated that its survival cannot be taken for granted but is dependent on vigilance and struggle by focusing on jewish patriotism from 1789 1939 this book explores the nature of the liberal state how it can fail and the conditions needed for its survival

we have become suspicious rightly of claims for literary greatness but in sebald s case the claim was triumphantly justified he was he is the real thing john banville guardian from acclaimed critic novelist and academic w g sebald author of austerlitz and the rings of saturn a collection of essay on the austrian writers who meant so much to him appearing for the first time in english as a german in self chosen exile from his country of birth sebald found a particular affinity with these writers from a neighbouring nation the traumatic evolution of austria from vast empire to diminutive alpine republic followed by its annexation by germany meant that concepts such as home land borderland and exile occupy a prominent role in its literature just as they would in sebald s own through a series of remarkable close readings of texts by bernhard stifter kafka handke roth and more sebald charts both the pathologies which so often drove their work and the seismic historical forces which shaped them this sequence of essays will be a revelation to sebald s english language readers tracing as they do so many of the themes which animate his own literary writings to which these essays form a kind of prelude a writer whose life and work has become a wonderful vindication of literary culture in all its subtle and entrancing complexity guardian sebald was probably the greatest intellect and voice of the late twentieth century antony beevor the times

one of our most important contemporary critics marjorie perloff has been a widely published and influential reviewer especially of poetry and poetics for over fifty years circling the canon volume i covers roughly the first half of perloff's career beginning with her first ever review on anthony hecht's the hard hours the reviews in this volume culled from a wide range of scholarly journals literary reviews and national magazines trace the evolution of poetry in the mid to late twentieth century as well as the evolution of perloff as a critic many of the authors whose works are reviewed in this volume are major figures such as w b yeats ezra pound sylvia plath and frank o hara others including mona van duyn and richard hugo were widely praised in their day but are now all but forgotten still others david antin edward dorn or the language poets exemplify an avant garde that was to come into its own

the companion to jewish culture from the eighteenth century to the present was first

published in 1989 it is a single volume encyclopedia containing biographical and topic entries ranging from 200 to 1000 word each

vienna of the late nineteenth century with its contrasting images of pomp and profound melancholy provides the backdrop for joseph roth s final novel which he completed in exile a few years before his tragic death in 1939 the tale of the 1002nd night is a brilliant allegorical tale of seduction and personal and societal ruin set amidst exquisite wistful descriptions of a waning aristocratic age and provides an essential link to our understanding of roth s extraordinary fictive powers

over the last decade migration flows from central and eastern europe have become an issue in political debates about human rights social integration multiculturalism and citizenship in great britain the increasing number of eastern europeans living in britain has provoked ambivalent and diverse responses including representations in film and literature that range from travel writing humorous fiction mockumentaries musicals drama and children s literature to the thriller the present volume discusses a wide range of representations of eastern and central europe and its people as reflected in british literature film and culture the book offers new readings of authors who have influenced the cultural imagination since the nineteenth century such as bram stoker george bernard shaw joseph conrad and arthur koestler it also discusses the work of more contemporary writers and film directors including sacha baron cohen david cronenberg vesna goldsworthy kapka kassabova marina lewycka ken loach mike phillips joanne k rowling and rose tremain with its focus on post wall europe facing the east in the west goes beyond discussions of migration to britain from an established postcolonial perspective and contributes to the current exploration of new european identities

in 1918 the danube monarchy ceased to exist and its provinces became parts of the monarchy s successor states which increasingly assumed the character of nation states the regimes of these countries were usually oblivious and or hostile to remnants of the erstwhile austrian rule due to ideological reasons they treated them as traces of a superimposed imperial power and an alien democratic pluralistic liberal tradition notwithstanding that fact erasing the habsburg empire from maps of europe did not entail the entire cancelation of its legacy on the former habsburg territories although officially neglected or suppressed this legacy made itself felt overtly or tacitly in discourses present in the public sphere of the countries that superseded the monarchy

the blossom which we are traces the emergence of a distinctly modern form of human vulnerability our intimate dependence on the fragile and time bound cultural frameworks that we inhabit as it manifests in the realm of the novel nir evron juxtaposes seminal works from diverse national literatures to demonstrate that the trope of cultural extinction offers key insights into the emotional and ideological work performed by the realist novel with an analysis that ranges from the works of maria edgeworth and walter scott edith wharton s age of innocence and joseph roth s radetzky march and yaakov shabtai s past continuous and finally to the current state of the humanities this book seeks to recover literary criticism s humanistic mission bringing the best that has been thought and said to bear on urgent contemporary concerns

assessing the impact of fin de siècle jewish culture on subsequent developments in literature and culture this book is the first to consider the historical trajectory of austrian jewish writing across the 20th century it examines how vienna the city that stood at the center of jewish life in the austrian empire and later the austrian nation assumed a special significance in the imaginations of jewish writers as a space and an idea the author focuses

on the special relationship between austrian jewish writers and the city to reveal a century long pattern of living in tension with the city experiencing simultaneously acceptance and exclusion feeling unheimlich heimisch eerily at home in vienna

the first conceptual history of the development and evolution of the image of jews and jewish participation in modern german speaking cosmopolitanist thought

the twentieth century in europe was characterized by great moments of rupture such as two world wars ideological conflict and political polarization in these processes as well as in the historical writing that followed in its wake the individual as an historical entity often appeared crushed in line with contemporary theories about the precariousness of historical writing and the self this volume seeks to understand the important developments in modern europe from the perspective of the single sometimes isolated but always original viewpoint of individuals inhabiting the space at the other side of the traditional grand narratives including theoretical chapters as well as detailed case studies this volume takes a biographical approach to dystopian events the holocaust fascism communism and collectivization by starting with the voices of unknown historical actors and relating their experiences to larger processes in modern european history such as the emergence of the national collective memory and state formation as well as changes in the understanding of modern identities and the re formulation of the self this book was originally published as a special issue of the european review of history

strongly influencing european musical life from the 1880s through the first world war and remaining highly productive into the 1940s richard strauss enjoyed a remarkable career in a constantly changing artistic and political climate this volume presents six original essays on strauss s musical works including tone poems lieder and operas and brings together letters memoirs and criticism from various periods of the composer s life many of these materials appear in english for the first time in the essays leon botstein contradicts the notion of the composer s stylistic about face after elektra derrick puffett reinforces the argument for strauss s artistic consistency by tracing in the tone poems and operas the phenomenon of pitch specificity james hepokoski establishes strauss as an early modernist in an examination of macbeth michael steinberg probes the composer s political sensibility as expressed in the 1930s through his music and use of such texts as friedenstag and daphne bryan gilliam discusses the genesis of both the text and the music in the final scene of daphne timothy jackson in his thorough source study argues for a new addition to the so called four last songs among the correspondence are previously untranslated letters between strauss and his post hofmannsthal librettist joseph gregor the memoirs range from early biographical sketches to rudolf hartmann s moving account of his last visit with strauss shortly before the composer s death critical reviews include recently translated essays by theodor adorno guido adler paul bekker and julius korngold publisher description

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
